Nowashe Village Receives an Award of Merit

The Connecticut League of History Organizations (CLHO) recognizes excellence in Connecticut history through its annual Awards of Merit, and this year the Friends of Wood Memorial Library & Musuem were recipients of the award for Nowashe Village, South Windsor's newest museum. Staff and board members accepted the award at a ceremony held at the Connecticut Historical Society.



Nowashe Village was recognized as "an exemplary model of best practice in the thoughtful interpretation of Indigenous history."

"More than a quarter of the project's construction spending was paid directly to Native Americans or tribal reservations," says Executive Director, Carolyn Venne, (pictured above) "and we continue to include and encourage local Indigenous Peoples to share their cultural heritage and modern challenges." In recognition of the Award of Merit, the organization also received an official citation from the Connecticut General Assembly, introduced by Senator Saud Anwar and Representatives Tom Delnicki and Jeff Currey. "It speaks volumes that Nowashe Village is so supported by our local and state officials," noted Education Director, Liz Glaviano (pictured above).

In 2021, its inaugural year, Nowashe Village welcomed more than 1,000 people from the region, and school field trips have expanded to include additional public school districts and many regional community groups. Nowashe is a permanent outdoor museum of Indigenous life that is set on almost an acre of wooded land. Open seasonally, it features a classroom-sized Sachem's House, two wigwams, a Three Sisters Garden, a wetland overlook, community gathering space and more, all connected by woodland trails featuring ethno-botanical plantings.

Nowashe Welcomes Experts

Our second year of programming at Nowashe Village is already off to an incredible start. Early in May we welcomed the Archaeological Society of Connecticut for their 2022 Spring Meeting which included a presentation by Connecticut State Archaeologist, Dr. Sarah Sportman.

We will welcome Dr. Lucianne Lavin, for two presentations in 2022, An Introduction to Connecticut's Indigenous Communities, in person in May and A Native Winter virtually in November. Dr. Wilfredo Nieves will also be leading two programs, Exploring the Taino; Origins & Culture in September, and Genocide & Continuation in October.



Connecticut Open House Day in June will feature Dr. Nick Bellantoni, Connecticut State Archaeologist Emeritus, (pictured left) who will be on hand for our 3rd Annual Artifact ID Day in Nowashe.

Inspired by our strategic plan, we have made the difficult decision to eliminate our adult fiction collection due to low circulation. The upper mezzanine library area where the fiction is currently held will transform to a research library and workspace. Several research collections will be relocated here and be cataloged and searchable online. These include the Hartford Audubon collection, the June and David G. Cooke Archaeological collection, oral history transcripts, scores of Native American resources, and much more. Relocating these materials will save precious space in our archival vault and more collections and exhibits will be able to be on permanent or rotating display.
